Then, your annotations should include two to three paragraphs of analysis, evaluation, and connection outline why is the source useful or relevant; how does the source relate to your research topic; what specifically helps your paper.

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MLA usually requires everything to be double-spaced, but for our purposes, single space looks better. Make sure you include a line between each item.
